NEW OPPORTUNITIES

SH.A.R.E. is proud to announce the start of a new project, the Central American Initiative. This new project will provide opportunities for over 6,000 people in 50 impoverished agriculturally based communities in 3 countries.

SHARE is extremely grateful for the opportunity to work with two private foundations that will match funds raised by SHARE for this three year project. The Barrett Family Foundation and Willowool Foundation will donate one dollar for each dollar raised by SHARE for this community development project that includes agriculture (tools, training, irrigation and marketing), youth skills training and small enterprise. Targeted rural communities will benefit from health and well being components - eco stoves, household water filters, an anti violence program and capacity building.

SHARE will direct the project that will be implemented by three long-time, capable partners working to improve impoverished and disadvantaged rural communities in El Salvador, Honduras and Guatemala.

Government funding is not currently available to small not for profits like SHARE so the funding from these private foundations is transformational for our organization!

SHARE is working to raise an additional \$50,000 each year for this project by maximizing fundraising efforts and applying for new funds from funding sources such as service clubs, churches and granting foundations.

SHARE invites you to assist with this project and with all of SHARE's work by donating. There are many reasons to recommend our foundation to friends

SHARE's partners use three proven methods to expand the available scarce resources, to include large numbers of needy families and to provide mutual support; they work with *cooperative groups*, develop *local leadership* and develop a *promoter system*.

Mirza's words, "We are working to leave no one behind," powerfully illustrates her organization's and SHARE's best intentions... to indeed leave no one behind.

Mirza and all members of the young APROSARSTUN organization, SHARE's partner in eastern Guatemala, are dedicated to taking the skills that they have learned and applying them for the benefit of everyone in their own remote, isolated and very needy communities.

Like other effective development partners, Mirza's organization is using three proven methods to include as many people as possible in the project work. They use cooperative efforts, foster local leadership and put a promoter system in place.

When a SHARE project is implemented with cooperative community groups, inclusiveness, fairness and openness are ensured. The community knows that they own the project as they work together guided by the experience and judgement

of SHARE's southern partner. They know they will equally benefit from their cooperative efforts.

Another way to empower a community is to foster local leadership. Sustainable capacity is built when SHARE's southern partners build on natural leadership skills and train local leaders. Fostering leadership on remote land settlements in Brazil and in Central America has been very important to champion and guide SHARE's projects there.

A third way of guiding and extending the work of a SHARE project is to train local promoters. Where low income governments cannot assist or will not

supply technical supports to marginalized farming communities, the SHARE project trains a local person called a promoter who will then share technical skills and expertise. In Bolivia and Guatemala, the trained promoter monitors the new orchards watching for infestations and tracking healthy growth; the promoter has been trained to make and apply organic pesticide as needed. Other promoters visit homes in Guatemalan villages to ensure proper use and maintenance of the new eco stoves and water filters. The promoter in the rural communities in El Salvador schedules the use of the irrigation pump shared by several farmers and safely stores the pump at night. The promoter system places knowledge and skills in the local community and ensures sustainability.

SHARE's effective partners use local leadership, cooperative efforts and trained local promoters to ensure that each SHARE project "leaves no one behind".

The three year "Pumps for Food" project initiated by Mark Cullen and his friend Dr. Jim Clubine was a very timely intervention. The irrigation systems prevented food shortages and

alleviated misery for many families during the prolonged and devastating wide spread, two year drought in the Dry Corridor of Central America. Both partners maximized the use of these funds by having the cooperative groups (up to 23 families) share the equipment. Thank you again, Mark and Jim, for your generosity in initiating this project!



The four components (literacy, food production, youth skills training and eco stove building) worked to alleviate poverty and improve the lives of hundreds of rural, impoverished families in 95 communities in El Salvador and Honduras.
