RIGHT SHARE funded dairy herds have lifted many cooperative groups of farm families out of abject poverty. Families not only have improved nutrition but also increase their income selling cheese and the bull calves.

This year, in SHARE's 40th year of operation, we celebrate the incredible contributions of the SHARE founders, the dedicated donors, the leadership and the hard work of volunteers.

For 40 years, SHARE has funded hundreds of small, sustainable projects that provided a *hand up* so rural families with very little could help themselves and improve their lives through their own efforts. SHARE has seen many times how a small hand up can be used as a building

block for further development. Recently, a group in Brazil and a cooperative of farmers in Honduras used the SHARE water project to not only water gardens and crops as planned but to implement their own new project, fish production.

Forty years ago, the founders were inspired to use the *pass on principle* to expand results in each project. Seeds, cuttings, small animals, skills or knowledge will be shared with neighbours. This pass on is being well used to expand a small dairy herd in Guatemala, the goat herds in Brazil and the ever expanding dairy herds in El Salvador. In a SHARE project, SHARE's partners also use their version of pass on, expanding their reach by using local promoters and farmer to farmer exchanges.


Through the 40 years, SHARE has worked for *sustainable results* in each

project. The offspring of the original dairy cattle shipped to Brazil are still producing milk for Sister Ellen's program for slum children. Each of the irrigation systems funded in the recent "Pumps for Food" initiative (funds raised by SHARE's honorary patron Mark Cullen and his friend Dr. Jim Clubine) are still effectively increasing food production and income for many cooperative groups.

For 40 years, SHARE has worked to be *effective and accountable*. SHARE has learned and grown along the way, inspired in the same way that SHARE's founders were, to reduce poverty and improve food security for rural communities.

When we reflect on the 40 years of SHARE's work, our hearts are filled with pride and gratitude!

THE GIFT OF WATER

“We want to thank the donors. We are trying our best to look after the project.”

The women of El Rosario, a small community in Guatemala, put their babies on their back and walked over an hour to fetch water for their family each day. Children often missed school when they were sent to the stream to get a jug of water. With a small grant from SHARE and some local collaboration, the community now has the convenience of having water stations near their homes. This water project is one component of a community development program to improve food production and well-being in 13 small needy Mayan communities in the region.

First there was a vision for a better life and then planning with SHARE’s

local partner organization and the municipality. A spring was located near the village and the men dug there to create a shallow well. (The well will be dug deeper in the dry season.) They built a small pump house and buried the pipes in the ground. SHARE provided a pump, the storage tanks and 1.4 km of pipe. Water is pumped up the hill to fill 2 large tanks. Then water moves by gravity to taps in the village. The water is strained and put through water filters in the homes and the school. (Funds for water filters were donated by Rotary Clubs.)

“Having water is easy now. We are seeing with our own eyes what is needed in our village, not like before. We are working hand in hand together.”



MATCHED FUNDING

The water system described above is part of the project called the Central American Initiative. This initiative receives generous matched funding from the **Barrett Family Foundation** and **Willowool Foundation**. The initiative is managed by effective partners working to improve the lives of rural families in 3 countries in 70 communities with irrigation, ecological agricultural training, inputs and tools, youth skills training and interventions in health and well-being. This project focuses on youth to provide reasons to stay and work locally and be a positive part of their rural communities.
