



CULTIVATING HOPE

In developing countries it is often the families of small scale farmers that lack variety in their diets due to their very low income, an over reliance on one traditional staple food crop and a lack of knowledge about nutrition. Children may not develop to their potential due to undernourishment and adults lack energy for their work. These rural families often experience hunger before the next crop is harvested or when adverse weather damages crops. Families cut back on food and spend most of their meagre income on food purchases or go hungry in the “hungry months”.

SHARE provides a hand up to those

willing to help themselves in small food production projects. This hand up brings hope and promise to families who have very little other support.

In SHARE’s projects, families are assisted to diversify their diets by growing fruits and vegetables in small orchards and in “kitchen gardens”. The SHARE project provides seeds, small fruit trees, tools, training and assistance. In cases where irrigation is added in the project, families can grow crops in periods of drought or in the dry season. With this water, where there is heat and sunshine year round, vegetable production can be doubled and tripled.

How does your garden grow? SHARE’s gardens are growing very well! There are many small gardens in several countries in SHARE’s projects. Gardens provide nutrition and diversity in families’ diets and in some cases, gardens provide a little income from local sales.

Key to the success of any SHARE project is the help of the agriculture technician who will provide the initial training and advice and who will arrive with the appropriate inputs for each project. The local promoter, a trained community volunteer, will be the local contact and will be there to assist and give practical advice.

In these gardening projects SHARE’s assistance is cultivating more than fruits and vegetables. In each project SHARE is cultivating hope!

THE FRUITS OF OUR LABOUR

A few years ago SHARE funded a variety of fruit trees that were planted in 13 communities in eastern Guatemala to



diversify the limited diet of the families who relied on their staple corn crop. These small orchards and backyard plantings were diligently cared for in the Mayan communities. A promoter was trained to prune the fruit trees and to carefully watch for disease and



infestations of insects that might damage the young trees. At last, orange, mandarin, rambutan, mango, limes, lemons, cacao, bananas and pineapple are being harvested and eaten in all 13 communities providing families with rich nutrients for better health.



KITCHEN GARDENS IN BOLIVIA

Small kitchen gardens in Bolivia are providing lettuce, beets, carrots, parsley



and onions for 91 families who also received a water collection system on their roofs and a large water storage tank that provides household water in times of drought. The small backyard gardens are watered by drip irrigation systems which



were also provided in the project. Besides enjoying these vegetables for improved nutrition, the families were able to give small amounts of produce to neighbours and sold some produce at the local market to increase meagre household income.

Youth in El Salvador who are participating in a leadership training program are learning ways to diversify farm production.



They have toured market gardens, worked as apprentices on small farms and are creating their own cooperative garden enterprises. The purpose of the program is to train youth to contribute in their rural communities, to avoid the gangs prevalent in their communities and have a reason to stay and not attempt migration.



PLANTING A BETTER FUTURE FOR YOUTH

SHARE's current project in El Salvador, Brazil, Honduras and Guatemala intentionally includes youth in the agriculture component. Youth in the agriculture classes at Ak'tenamit school

have cared for many fruit trees funded by SHARE and are now harvesting citrus, cacao, plantain and bananas. The students share their new knowledge and skills in agriculture with their rural communities.

COOPERATIVE MARKET GARDENS

SHARE has supplied inputs and training to families in El Salvador working in cooperative groups managing successful market gardens. The groups have only a small amount of rented land available for their enterprises, but with a stream nearby and a simple irrigation system (provided in the Pumps for Food project) the groups are able to maximize productivity and sell produce all year

round. The families were taught how to make a homemade fertilizer from low cost local ingredients, a key step in enriching the soil and minimizing expenses. Shade houses are used to control insects and protect the plants during the seasonal torrential rains. The extension specialist in the SHARE project assists the cooperatives to find markets for their production.



In Guatemala, farmers have devoted a section of their small fields to plantings of pineapple, peppers and tomatoes. Families have this new produce to eat and are thrilled to have the small income from sales at the local market.
